From the Rectory Study

In the last two editions of this magazine, I have made reference to the proposed renovation of the Minor Hall. This will be a significant project for our Parish and one that will richly benefit our continued mission and ministry. We had our special Gift Day during our harvest weekend in early October and all donations that were received will be in aid of the renovation project. Once again, the incredible generosity of the parishioners of Mossley was clearly demonstrated and I am delighted that £11,605 was raised. When gift aid is applied to these donations then our overall total will be approximately £14,000. I would like to express my sincere thanks to everyone who donated to this appeal and encourage us to unite in giving thanks to God.

The renovation of the Minor Hall is part of our ongoing strategic plan within Mossley Parish. In April 2022, at our Easter Vestry, I shared a presentation that focused on vision setting and offered some ideas as to how we could progress and develop as a parish in the post-COVID years. The vision was based on three main words and these related to three stages of parish development: regather, rebuild, renew. During the past three years we have been working through the regathering and rebuilding phases. The attendance levels at our Sunday services are almost back to their pre-COVID levels and it has been encouraging to welcome new parishioners to Mossley. Many of our parochial organisations are also growing and we long to see this trend continue. We are engaging with our local community in a variety of positive and meaningful ways, and we seek to develop this even further. I have no doubt that the renovation of the Minor Hall will be significant as we pursue this vision.

As we approach 2026, we are now entering the third and final phase of the strategy that I shared in April 2022 – the renew phase. This will be an exciting chapter for us in Mossley as we seek to step, with confidence, into God's future for our Parish. We will look to develop our mission and ministry as we strive to live out our Christian faith within our local community in new and ambitious ways. I often reflect on the massive potential for growth that there is within our local community. This is encouraging but also challenging. It leads me to ask some big questions with openness and honesty. How effective are we at radiating our Christian faith to those who live around us? What are we doing well and what are the areas where we need to develop?

In a few weeks it is Christmas. The birth of Jesus reminds each of us that God cares deeply about us. Regardless of what we might be facing or how significant the challenges may be, the reality that Jesus is Immanuel, God with us, speaks clearly and powerfully. We can trust God and we should trust God. This Christmastime, let us rejoice in what God has done and continues to do for us. Let us pray for our Parish as we enter 2026 with confidence.

On behalf of the Rectory family, may I wish each of you a blessed Christmas and I pray that we would all know and follow the leading of God in 2026.

When God says 'NO'

Can you remember some of the times when you were young and you asked your parents for things that were either unaffordable or very unhealthy? The answer was usually 'No!' and may have been shortly followed by 'Because I said so!' We sensed that they knew better but we still resented not getting what we wanted.



As adults, we pray and ask our Father in heaven for reasonable, sensible things like a home, a career or partner in life. Indeed, didn't our Lord say "Ask and it will be given to you" (Matt. 7:7), and yet, no matter how hard we pray, sometimes the answer seems to be 'No.' We can think that God is cold and uncaring, and this leads to terrible resentment. God always responds to our prayers but, like the wise Father He is, He prefers to give us what is good for us, rather than what we necessarily ask for. Remember that He also said, "I know the plans I have for you.

Plans to prosper you and not to harm you" (Jeremiah 29:11). Dr Charles Stanley said that sometimes when God says 'no' He's protecting you; sometimes He's saying 'not yet.' C. S Lewis once reflected, "If God had granted all the silly prayers I've made in my life, where would I be now?"

There are many instances in the Bible where God used His wisdom and foreknowledge for the greater good of His people. King David offered to build a temple to house the ark of the covenant but God declined knowing that David still had battles, both moral and military, in the years ahead that would take his full attention. Solomon was permitted to build it instead (2 Sam. 7:13). Three times St. Paul prayed to have a 'thorn removed from his flesh' and three times God refused in order to teach Paul that His grace was enough (2 Cor. 12:7). The most profound example, of course, was that of our Lord Jesus on his knees in the Garden of Gethsemane imploring his Father to take the horror of crucifixion away from him (Mark 14:36). We will never begin to know how hard that must have been for God to say no to His most beloved son! The price was our salvation.

We may understand all of this, but what about the time someone we loved dearly was gravely ill and we prayed with all our heart and strength that they be healed ... but they died anyway. Angry and forlorn, it's understandable that we might turn our backs on God. We grieve for ourselves, for our own loss, but Bishop Abernethy once suggested that God's most perfect healing for the one we love was sometimes simply to take them home to be with Him forever. Immanuel means 'God with us' and He is there supporting and comforting us in our grief, just as much as He was with His own beloved son on the cross. We don't understand the 'no' but, because of our Saviour's resurrection and our trust and faith in our Father God, we have the certain assurance that the separation is temporary and we will one day be together again with those we love dearly.

The Prayer Fellowship meets each Wednesday evening in the Pentecost Room at 7.30pm to sing God's praise, hear His Word and talk to Him about all our hopes, worries and plans. Silent prayer is absolutely fine! If you are free, we would be delighted to see you.

Community Lunches

The Parish Christmas Lunch will be held in the Parish Centre on Wednesday 10th December, 12noon for 12.30pm. We will be serving turkey, ham and stuffing with vegetables and potatoes. There will be a choice of two deserts: Christmas pudding or apple crumble and custard, with tea and coffee.

A special thanks to Antrim & Newtownabbey Borough Council who, once again this year, have allocated a grant towards the meal. This allows us to keep the cost at £12 per person.






Crèche, Club J & Ignite Youth
















Antrim & Newtownabbey Street Pastors



Prayer has always been an important part of Street Pastors. Indeed, each patrol evening and all of our other events always begin with prayer. We pray for each other and we pray for other people who may be experiencing difficulties or challenges. Quite often, we also pray for good weather when we are heading out at night. It does seem to rain less when we pray for good weather!

Sometimes when we are out on patrol, we actually have the opportunity to engage in silent prayer

walking. As we walk, we identify localised issues that we can pray for. There are signs of poverty and hardship, as well as indicators of excess and plenty. There are also the parties in the pubs, as well as young people gathering in open areas to consume alcohol and sometimes drugs.

Prayer is also of tremendous benefit to each of us in our own lives. We can spend time with God, ask for His forgiveness for all the times we have let Him and other people down, and ask for His blessing on our families and friends. All of us have things that we could pray about. Personally, I have always found that prayer helps me to experience the peace that only God can give.

I remember being asked by a group of four young women if I would pray for them. They were 'out on the town' and one, who was a church goer, asked me what God would think of them heading out. After we spoke for a few moments, we had a group hug and I prayed for them. Twenty or thirty years ago I would never have contemplated finding myself in that sort of situation, praying for and with total strangers on the street.

In Street Pastors we have a group of volunteers who are called 'Prayer Pastors.' They don't normally go out on the streets. Rather, they meet with the Street Pastors at the start of an evening and pray for them. They continue to pray for the Street Pastors throughout the evening. Normally, contact is maintained throughout the evening via telephone. Any prayer requests are passed onto the Prayer Pastors. Could you become a Prayer Pastor?

Even if you would not consider doing this (we are always looking for recruits) can I ask you all to pray for me and the other Street Pastors - or indeed anyone else who goes out onto the streets to engage in mission and ministry. Thank you for the peace which I receive knowing that I am supported by you all.

Mossley Mission Group

Mossley Parish continues to support Tansen hospital and SAMS Ireland, and we are thankful for your continued generosity. In this edition of the magazine, we have a special focus on Tansen.

Where is Tansen?



The hospital is in the Tansen Municipality of the Palpa District of Lumbini Province of Nepal, serving thousands of patients from western Nepal and northern India. Nepal is independent, landlocked country situated between India and China. It shares a long border with China to its north and with India to its south, east and west. It has eight of the world's highest mountains. including (of course) Mount Everest. The capital is Kathmandu.

How did the work in Tansen hospital begin?

In 1951 an ornithologist called Dr Fleming and his wife, who was a medical doctor, along with Dr Friedericks and his family, visited Tansen. While there, they treated patients and even performed surgery. The people asked them to establish a hospital. In 1954, the newly formed United Mission to Nepal (UMN) agreed to start health work in the Kathmandu valley and Tansen. UMN is a faith-based development organisation whose vision is "fullness of life for all in a transformed Nepali society." Since 1959, when the first building opened, more has been added: a training hostel; accommodation and classrooms; a new nursing station; a high dependency unit. June 2024 saw great 70th birthday celebrations and the development of a new administration building.



This year, two big infrastructure projects reached completion. The wastewater project for the hospital and the local community was a long time in planning (seven years), and also a new postnatal ward creating an eighteen-bed facility for mothers and new-borns. It is thrilling to see how this work has developed and grown, and continues to do so.

The latest addition of the CT scanner will really help as it means patients will not have to be referred elsewhere for expensive tests. The photo shows the arrival of the CT scanner.

How did Mossley Parish start to support Tansen?

In 1986 Rev Cutcliffe decided that, following the good work in building the church by Rev Forsythe in the 1970s and Rev Hopkins in the early 80s, it was time to look beyond our Parish boundaries. He approached C.M.S Ireland and they proposed supporting a young nurse called Sandra O'Donnell and she ended up working in Tansen hospital. In 1988 Sandra became our Mission Partner and the Sunday School children, under the guidance of Dorothy Beck, wrote to Sandra. This link continued when Billy McCormick took over as Sunday School Superintendent later that year. We are grateful to Billy for providing this background.

- Praise God for His hand over many years on the work at Tansen Hospital.
- Seek His blessing and guidance upon Dr Rachel Karrach, Hospital Director.
- Give thanks for the new CT scanner which has arrived and is due to be installed soon.
