From the Rectory Study

As I watched the consecration of our new Bishop, Rt. Rev George Davison, which was broadcast online, the preacher at the service was Bishop Ken Clarke. He rightly suggested that we will all be looking forward to New Year's Eve this year - not just to welcome in 2021, but to make sure that 2020 concludes! There is an undoubted truth in this! The past six months have been challenging for all of us. We have become accustomed to social distancing, contact tracing, and other such restrictions and protocols. Yet we are also moving forward into 'a new normal.'

I am delighted that we have resumed 'in-church' services on Sunday mornings and from Sunday 20th September we have returned to two morning services (9.30am and 11.30am). We have also been working hard to prepare for the reopening of our Parish Centre and we look forward to seeing what the 'new normal' looks like for Mossley Parish. I would like to say a sincere thank you to everyone who has worked so hard to ensure that the Church building and Parish Centre can be reopened. I would also like to thank each one of you for your prayerful, practical, and financial support of our Parish.

There have been some extremely difficult and testing days during the past six months but, with the grace of God, we can begin a safe and steady journey forward. We have started conversations with the parish organisations to see how we can recapture the wonderful sense of community that exists at the heart of Mossley Parish, and we look forward to being able to sing again in our church services in the very near future. Things will continue to look differently for some time to come but we can make safe progress.

Through the entire lockdown period I have often thought about Psalm 121. As this Psalm begins, we can almost picture the Psalmist as a traveller on a dusty road just outside Jerusalem. He looks up and sees the hills in the distance, one of which is Mount Zion. Our traveller sees the brilliance, the wonder and the majesty of God's creation and it inspires him to think. What does he think about? He thinks about eternal things, he mulls over life's greatest questions, and he asks one of them at the end of (v1): "...where does my help come from?" It's a beautiful picture, isn't it! The Psalmist walking in the vicinity of Jerusalem thinking about God and the things of God. We know that he is thinking about God because he answers his own question. "Where does my help come from? My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth." The Psalmist declares God to be the ultimate source of help. May we continue to follow his example and turn to God in prayer, confident that He is our continued help and strength in the weeks and months ahead.

Dear Friends,

We reconvened for 'in-church' worship on Sunday 19th July at 11am and were delighted to have Bishop George Davison with us on that occasion. Since then we have met each Sunday morning and it has been encouraging to see so many of you back in the church building. **Due to the increasing numbers we have decided to put on an additional service, and this has necessitated a slight variation in service times. Our first service will be at 9.30am and our second service will begin at 11.30am**. <u>Please be assured that the church will be cleaned</u> <u>using our fogging machine between the services</u>. Both services will follow the same structure and will last approximately 35 minutes. Once again, if you are planning to attend either of these services, please enter the church only through the front doors.

Due to social distancing restrictions the occupancy of our church building is still greatly reduced. These measures are in place for everyone's health and safety and must be strictly adhered to. We, therefore, need to forward plan attendance numbers at services and kindly ask that you contact either Mrs Winifred Clarke (07749064808) or Mr John Nesbitt (07954150067) to confirm your attendance at a Sunday service. This can be done from Monday morning until Thursday evening each week.

Part of the reopening procedures encourage us to engage in contact tracing. This means that each person will be required to fill out a tracing form as proof of attendance at the service. Please bring a pen with you to the church service to enable you to fill out this form. No collection will be lifted during the service but Free Will Offering envelopes can be placed in the offering plate which will be located on the Font. Your tracing form can also be placed in a box at the front of the church.

We will continue our online services on Sunday mornings (on YouTube, Facebook, the Dial-In Facility, and our website <u>www.mossley.org</u>). These will be the same as the services that will be provided in the church building. Each day we joined Professor Moody and her guest professors as they shared their knowledge of all things science and



took us on a journey through the story of Noah and the great flood. It was great fun and we were pleased that a number of our young people were able to take part.

Streetreach Online

Streetreach looked hugely different this year. Last year we had over fifty young people from throughout Connor Diocese and the USA meeting each day in our Parish Centre and engaging in a range of activities. This year we were unable to meet in person so the concept of 'Streetreach Online' emerged.

We started on Wednesday 1st July and continued until Friday 3rd July. On the opening day, Church Army Evangelist Stephen Whitten shared about how the programme would lead the young people deeper in their faith. In the days that followed the young people and leaders took part in daily devotionals each morning – these were shared on the Engage Connor Youth Facebook page. We explored the themes of prayer,



service, and testimony in our time together. The Rector led the devotional on the first day and this was followed by a range of ideas shared by Christina Baillie, Diocesan Youth Officer, for how individuals could respond.

Our partnership with Streetreach will continue next year and we hope and pray that we will be able to physically meet in Mossley. We would like to thank everyone who took part in Streetreach Online – especially the young people from our own parish.


Coffee Time Challenges

A Consecration Like No Other!



It was a Consecration Service like no other – rows of empty pews, no congregational singing, and the use of hand sanitiser before the individual laying on of hands – but at 5.30pm on Thursday the waiting was over for the Rt Rev George Davison – and Connor Diocese finally had a new Bishop!

Bishop George was consecrated on September 3 at a service in St Patrick's Cathedral, Armagh, conducted under strict Covid-19 restrictions. The service took place in the presence of a congregation of less than 30, when in normal circumstances several hundred would have attended.

In a video message to the diocese recorded on the eve of the Service of Consecration, Bishop George said: "This is a service that has been in planning for some time, a

considerable time longer than any of us had realised."

He continued: "That delay, of course, has been caused by the same coronavirus emergency that has turned all our lives upside down over the last number of months. As individuals and as a society, we face challenges that we have never had to deal with before. It has caused real heartache for many people, and for some, the challenges they have faced make the delay of a service feel very insignificant."

The Bishop reflected: "Even as we take...tentative steps back into our church buildings again, I am very conscious that we still have challenges ahead of us," he said. "We have to be realistic about the challenges ahead, but I am convinced that they should not, and will not, define us."


Ordination of Rev Louise Bowes

General Vestry Meeting

Our Easter General Vestry had to be postponed because of lockdown restrictions. On Thursday 10th September Connor Diocesan Council met and we have now been asked to hold our General Vestry Meeting. This has been scheduled for <u>Tuesday 6th October 2020 at</u> <u>7pm in the Church.</u>

This is a triennial year and, in addition to electing Churchwardens, Glebewardens, and a Select Vestry, we will also be voting for Parochial Nominators and Diocesan Synod Representatives, as well as supplementals.

Please be assured that we are taking every available step to ensure the safety of everyone in attendance! The meeting will be kept as short as possible and unfortunately no tea will be available afterwards.



We kindly ask that if you plan to attend this meeting that you would bring your own pen and the use of facemasks will be strongly encouraged.

Mission Work Updates

During the lockdown, the Rector was in correspondence with Tansen Hospital. The following email was sent from Dr Rachel Karrach.

Dear Peter



As everywhere these days the pandemic has dominated our lives recently. Nepal was under lockdown from March 24th and this was eased on July 21st, I think because the economic effects were too great, not because things are under control. So, the past 4 months have been taken up with covid-19 preparations and care and trying to keep the hospital running for general care too during the lockdown. Nepal has reached 20,000 cases now. Most were imported by returning migrant workers. We set up a small isolation area in 3 rooms for suspected cases and started screening everyone who comes through our doors. We also did a lot of training of staff about the virus and how to put on and take off PPE correctly. We also helped with health education to the community via FM radio and the municipality website and Facebook page. We were invited to help train government health workers and advise the army about infection control for their quarantine sites. We were given the use of a yet to be opened old people home at the edge of the community 5 minutes' walk from here and established an isolation unit there. We housed a few groups of young men there who had returned from India and tested positive, as the policy at the time was to keep these people in centres rather than send them home, although they were all asymptomatic. We now have no new cases there and although our district was one of the most affected initially because of the large numbers of migrant workers returning, we now seem to be in a lull. Kathmandu and some border districts have community spread, but we have not seen evidence of this yet. In early June we had our one sick coronavirus case, and sadly he died within 24 hours and was the first and, so far, only death in our district and at the time the 10th death in Nepal.

We have carried on being busy with our normal care too and although the first few weeks were really quiet numbers picked up and now there is freer travel within the district, we are up to 80% of normal. This helps us survive as most of our income comes from patients (or the government health insurance) So we initially furloughed some staff on half pay and encouraged anyone who was interested to take leave without pay and left posts vacant. From the past 2-3 weeks we have needed everyone again. We noticed from the beginning that many seriously ill people were managing to reach us, and it felt like the clock was turned back as people were presenting late in a more serious condition. Our emergency surgery numbers are up a bit and so were deliveries.

Some details of life in South America have also been forwarded from SAMS Ireland.

Paraguay has been in lock down like us since the end of March and Beryl Baker, a mission



partner in Paraguay, was unable to leave the ranch in the Chaco. More recently, she was able to travel a shorter distance to Lomo Plata where she picked up medical supplies from the retired Doctor Trudy who normally helps Beryl with medical trips to the Indian villages. The villages are shut down and only the men who have motor bikes can travel to Beryl's clinic on the ranch. Beryl can see patients there and provide medicines for blood pressure, diabetes, and epilepsy. Beryl was legally able to visit Asuncion the

capital because she brought with her a patient who needed to go to the hospital for treatment. Please pray for Beryl's safety as she moves from one location to another.

The news from North Argentina indicates that COVID 19 is beginning in the CHACO region. This has reminded everyone that the pandemic will have many consequences in the local Indian churches. Pray for local church leadership as they deal with these new set of challenges – especially Bishop Nick Drayson.

In Bolivia, Bishop Raphael has asked us to pray for the ever-deteriorating situation. The New York Times recently released new mortality figures which suggest that the real death

toll during the Covid-19 outbreak is nearly five times the official tally, indicating Bolivia is one of the worst affected nations in the world. The current death rate is more than twice as high as that of the United States, and far higher than the levels in Italy, Spain, and the United Kingdom.

About 20,000 more people have died since June than in past years, according to a Times analysis of registration data from



Bolivia's Civil Registry, a vast number in a country of only about 11 million people.
